The 2010 Georgian Fair

Since the last edition in January, we have been in contact with the new Town Centre Flood Recovery Co-ordinator, Les Tickner, to make sure that we knew where we could hold the various events involved in the Georgian Fair.

As you will understand, Memorial Gardens are not yet ready to take the sedan chair racing and the Cumberland wrestling demonstration, and we are therefore very grateful for permission to use Fairfield playing fields for the afternoon events.

The markets will take place in Market Place and on one half of Main Street by the Mayo statue. The dancing will take place at a number of venues around the town -in Bitter Beck car park, in Lowther Went, outside the United Reform Church - full details will be available on the day. The maypole will be sited in Bitterbeck car park, where

the children's circus skills workshops will also take place. A lot of the performers will be in and around Market Place, although as you are probably aware, a number of them can be found all around the town.

Our popular discovery walks will again take place this year, although the routes will be different from those in previous years. They will take in Cockermouth Castle, however.

Les Tickner is also ordering some new bunting, which he tells me will be ready for the Georgian Fair, so the town will look festive in time for the event. You will probably also have seen our new Georgian Fair signs which are on the entrances to the town and the vertical banners on Main Street. Posters are going up as well and will continue to do so, as we hope to ensure that everyone in Cockermouth will know about the Georgian Fair taking place and will come and join in.
